

It is a group of people learning about things that happened during the COVID-19 pandemic.



In this document Royal Commission of Inquiry into COVID-19 Lessons

Learned – Te Tira Ārai Urutā will be called the Royal Commission.



The Royal Commission is not part of the Government.



The Government can ask the Royal Commission what to look for.

The Government cannot tell the Royal Commission what should go into their report.



As part of their work the Royal Commission will tell the Government what they find out.

The Royal Commission is asking for **submissions** to the Inquiry into COVID-19 Lessons Learned.



A **submission** is when you tell people what you think about things.



This document will tell you how to make a submission to the Royal Commission.

What is the COVID-19 pandemic?



The **COVID-19 pandemic** started in Aotearoa New Zealand in 2020.



COVID-19 is a type of virus that makes people sick.





COVID-19 can affect your:

A **pandemic** is when many people around the world get the same sickness at the same time.

other organs / parts of your











There were lots of rules to follow during the COVID-19 pandemic like:

- lockdown
- wearing masks
- keeping a distance from people
- staying at home when sick
- taking tests
- getting the the COVID-19 vaccine.

Lockdown was when the
Government asked everyone to stay
at home so that they did not get sick.

A **vaccine** is a medicine that can help stop you from getting very sick.

What does the Royal Commission want to know?



The Royal Commission wants to know what people think about what happened during the COVID-19 pandemic.



The Royal Commission wants this information so they can be ready for other pandemics that might happen.



The Royal Commission has already looked at information from:



- research studies
- government organisations
- business.




Research studies are where people spend time collecting information about new things.



The Royal Commission has also talked to people in:

- education like:
 - o schools
 - universities
- health













The Royal Commission now wants to know:

- what happened to you during the COVID-19 pandemic
- what you think could be done better if other pandemics happen.

How to make a submission



You can tell the Royal Commission what you think by making a public submission.



You can do this at this website:

www.Covid19Inquiry.nz



Choose the submission form you want on that website.



You can type your answers into the textbox.









The submission form is available in:

- English
- Māori
- New Zealand Sign Language
- Simplified Chinese
- Hindi
- Samoan
- Tongan.

There are 2 questions for you to answer on the submission form.



You will also be asked to give information about who you are.



This will let the Royal Commission give better information to the Government.



You will be asked things like:



- your name
- where you live
- your **ethnicity**.













Ethnicity means your:

- race like:
 - Māori
 - o Samoan
 - o New Zealand European
- background like whether you:
 - were born in Aotearoa NewZealand
 - moved to Aotearoa New
 Zealand from another
 country.

You do not have to give this information about yourself.

The last day to make a submission is **24 March 2024**.

How to make a submission using NZSL




You can make your submission on the website using New Zealand Sign Language.



Choose the form that says New Zealand Sign Language.



You will need to click a button to record a video of your answers.



When you finish your video it will be emailed to the Royal Commission.

What are the questions?



There are 2 questions for you to answer.



You can answer:

1 question

or





• both questions.

1. Looking back



The first question asks you to talk about what happened to you during the COVID-19 pandemic.



You can talk about the things that changed in your life like:


- education like:
 - o school
 - o university
- health
- work
- relationships
- anything else.












- your family / whānau
- your partner
- your friends
- your neighbours
- people in your religious group like at church
- people in your community
- people you work with.

2. Moving forward



The second question asks you to talk about how Aotearoa New Zealand should get ready for a pandemic that might happen in the **future**.



The **future** is a time that has not happened yet.



You can talk about:



- what you would like Aotearoa
 New Zealand to do if another
 pandemic happens
- why you would like that to happen.



You can talk about the things you would like to:

- be done the same way
- be done differently.




